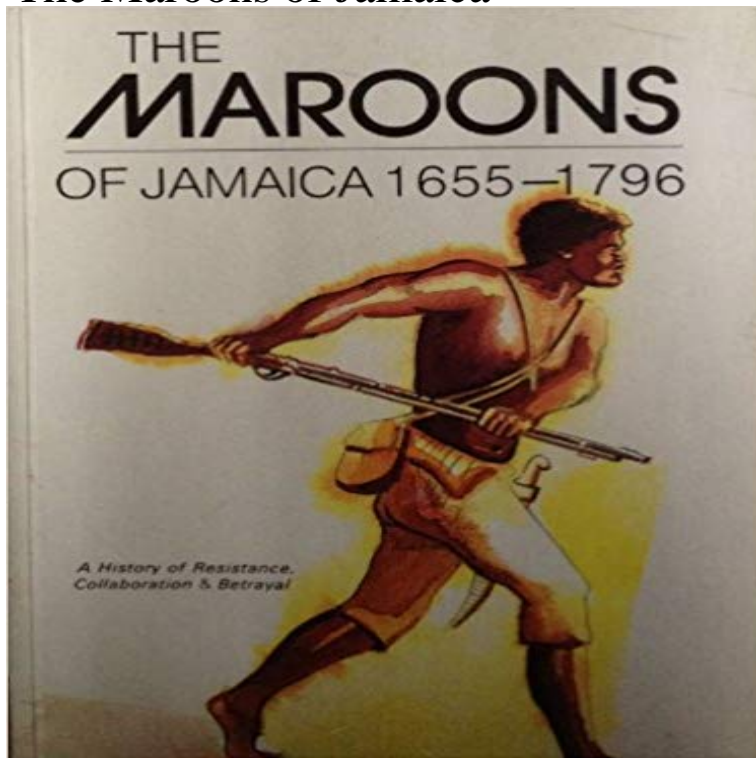


## The Maroons of Jamaica
